Qualifiers for Preparatory Academy Girl's Cross Country were: Annie Almaguer, Belen Berrocal, Belicia Hernandez, Amelia Humphreys, Ily Lopez, Renata Lugo, Devani Martinez, Ava Thomas, Elisha Trujillo. The team placed 3rd at the State meet with Annie Almaguer earning an 8th place finish, Amelia Humphreys finishing in 9th, and Ily Lopez rounding out at 20th place.

Overall, the girls were able to bring home the 3rd place trophy as a team. When asked about the success at the meet, assistant Coach Bonura said, "The girls did well. We're very proud of our team."

Amelia Humphreys, a new Spartan 6th grade runner, said "The meet was fun and I'm proud of all of our hard work that led us to this finish."

On the boys side, qualifying for the State meet were: Sebastian Carbajal, Eduardo Estrada, Oscar Garcia, Anthony Lara, Brady Lee, Emilio Montelongo, and Christian Moya. The boys' team came in strong and earned the 2nd place trophy overall as a team. Leading the team with the top finish was Anthony Lara earning 11th place.

Head Coach, Mr. Comple, said, "This season has been very successful for our boy's cross country team for many reasons. Firstly, we were able to compete at the state meet again and placed as runner-up, which was better than last years 4th placed finished. Secondly we were able to defend the district's and regional's championships, and had Spartan runners getting top individual awards at both meets."
